

SECOND SON IS DEAD

**Marshfield Couple, Who Lost One Boy
in Steven Point Battery,
Now Lose Another**

Last March Mr. and Mrs. John Arnett of Marshfield received notice of their death of their son George. The young man was a member of Battery "E," 120th field artillery, formerly Troop "I" of this city. He died on shipboard when the battery was on its way to France and his was the first, and so far as is known here, the only death that has occurred in the membership of the old Stevens Point troop.

Last Sunday Mr. and Mrs. Arnett received another sad official announcement. This came from the office of the adjutant general at Washington and stated that their son William had been accidentally killed in France. He fell off a train, the official announcement stated, but no particulars were given.

William Arnett, the second son to meet his death in the army, was born in Stevens Point in 1889 but removed to Marshfield with his parents when a small boy. During the Mexican trouble he enlisted in the regular army and was assigned to Company "A," 127th infantry, and went to France with that organization.
