He was ordered to Australia, and relatives here received a telegram from him on Christmas Day saying he was well.

The Kharkov offensive carried into Bogodukhov, 36 miles to the northwest on the railroad to Sumy; to Zmiev, 22 miles southeast of Kharkov; and Alekseevskoe, 38 miles south of Kharkov, just east of the rail line and north of Lozo-

Russian units previously had penetrated from the east to Lozovaya, which lies about 70 miles northeast of Dnieperopetrovsk.

Washington -(P)- The Office of Price Administration today made thousands of additional mo-torists eligible for "C" book gasoline rations.
"C" books formerly could be is-

sued only to drivers on a preferred list, such as physicians and essential war workers.

Today's order provided that, under certain circumstances per-sons who could not get enough gas on a "B" book to drive to and from work could get "C" books, regardless of occupation.
