Is Approved

The Wood County Telephone company was authorized today by the Wisconsin public service commission to incerase its rates, according to an Associated Press dispatch from

The boost will result in additional revenue of about \$80,853 annually and will permit the company to earn 6.18 per cent on its investment. It will increase the utility's net income from \$17,233 to \$38,048 annually, the public service commssion said.

Increases in local rates will vary from 75 cents to \$1.90 per month, depending upon the type of service. The largest increase will be on oneparty business lines. That charge will go from \$4.10 to \$6 per month. Four-party residential service will be increased from \$1.75 to \$2.50 per

The full schedule of new rates, which will become effective October 1, will be published in the near future, it was stated today by H. B. Flower, company manager. The last previous telephone rate revision here was in September, 1946.

The public service commission ruled that a five cent toll charge on calls between Wisconsin Rapids and Rudolph shall be continued. A boost to 10 cents for this service had been sought by the company.

The company serves 7,816 customers through its exchanges in Wisconsin Rapids, Nekoosa and Port is to be covered by a reserve fund which the village has been accumulating for the past 10 years, and no bond issue is contemplated, it was stated by Phil Nebles, village president.

Persons who have had a change of address since the last election must notify the city clerk by mail or in person to be eligible to vote in the next election, Justeson said. A person must not only be at least 21 years of age to be eligible to vote, but also a resident of the precinct in which he is going to vote for the past 10 days and a resident of the state for the past year.

Justeson said there are now about 8,700 voters registered in the city. A total of 4,480 votes were cast in the municipal election last April.
