

THE DEATH LIST.

A Number of Wisconsin Boys Succumb to Southern Fevers.

Charleston, S. C., Aug. 6.—[Special].—Alfred Bargeron, aged 24 years, a private in the Marshfield company, Second Wisconsin regiment, died last night of typhoid fever complicated with pneumonia and meningitis. His relatives were promptly notified, but have not telegraphed what disposition to make of the remains. This is the fourth Marshfield soldier to die since the troops left Wisconsin.

Jacksonville, Fla., Aug. 8.—[Special].—Private F. Nyard of Co. F died at the Travelers' hotel this morning of typhoid fever. His mother and father were at his bedside at the time, having been called several days ago, as Nyard's case was considered hopeless. He had been sick about four weeks. The remains will be shipped to Racine, Chaplain Varney holding services downtown this afternoon.

Madison, Wis., Aug. 10.—[Special].—Adjt.-Gen. Boardman this morning received a telegram from the surgeon of the Second Wisconsin regiment of volunteers announcing the death at sea on August 6, while on the way to Porto Rico, of George Edgerton of Co. K, Beaver Dam, and William Haue of Co. H, Manitowoc. Both were buried at sea.

Appleton, Wis., Aug. 10.—The first death among Appleton volunteers is recorded. A message received this forenoon states that John Schuh died of typhoid fever at Porto Rico on July 31. He was buried at Ponce. Schuh lived about two miles from the city, and, though not an original member of Co. G, enlisted at the first call.

La Crosse, Wis., Aug. 9.—[Special].—Merrie Casberg, the first soldier of the Third Wisconsin volunteers to lose his life in the war with Spain, was a member of Co. B of this city, and was taken in on the last recruiting order. During the early part of the war Casberg was associated with Dr. B. Frank Powell in raising the Wisconsin regiment of Rough Riders, and when that project fell through he lost no time in going to the front as a private in Co. B. He died aboard a transport between Charleston and Porto Rico. Casberg was 24 years of age, unmarried, and was a son of one of the oldest settlers of this county, residing in the town of Holmen.

Marshfield, Wis., Aug. 10.—[Special].—The remains of Alfred Bargeron, the third of Marshfield's soldier boys to die at Charleston, reached here this forenoon. The funeral will be held this afternoon. Today's races have been postponed one day.



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
