(Continued from Page One) were other speakers. In the absence of Chairman Fred Wilkins, A. J. Crowns, vice-chairman, gave the response on behalf of the selective service board.

Mayor Nobles' talk set the background for the solemn, war-time program—solemnity carried out in the quiet words of Commander Marks noting the death in the Pacific area of Bruce Bender, former Wisconsin Rapids man, who was killed in action, and the commander's call for a period of silent prayer for the men of the armed forces.

Mayor Nobles Speaks "Now, as never before, our nation must call upon each of us to reconsecrate our talents and energies, our wealth and our spirits, and nothing less will destroy the axis forces and the pagan evil behind which they stand," the mayor said.

"Today we should benefit from our mistakes of the past 20 years. We must not allow ourselves to be come soft and compromising. We cannot have all we want, if our soldiers are to have all they need. Each of us must not only be winning to give, but to give until it hurts, for wars are no longer fought by just the soldiers, but by all the people of all the nations at war.

"Freedom under law finds its highest expression in America. Nowhere in the world do people enjoy so many blessings, yet if we would preserve these we must do our duty, and there is no higher calling than the dedication of all our talents, all of our energies and all of our training to the perpetuation of these precious ideals."

LAST RITES FOR JUSTICE NELSON

Madison, Wis. —(AP)—The body of George B. Nelson, former justice of the state supreme court, was placed late yesterday in a vault at Forest Hill cemetery, to remain there until spring when burial services will be held at Stevens Point, his former home.

The interment followed funeral rites held at St. Andrew's Episcopal church and attended by prominent jurists, attorneys, educators and friends from many communities of the state.

Bishop Officials The Rt. Rev. Harwood Sturtevant, bishop of Fond du Lac, celebrated the requiem mass. He was assisted by the Rev. Frederick D. Butler, of Ripon, and the Rev. Francis J. Bloodgood, of St. Andrew's. Bishop Sturtevant eulogized Nelson as "a faithful, valiant soldier of Christ."

The former justice died Sunday following a long illness which forced him to retire from the court December 12. A Stevens Point attorney and Portage county prosecutor before he was named justice, Mr. Nelson served on the high tribunal for 13 years.

Leading Jurists Attend Headed by Chief Justice Marvin B. Rosenberry, all members of the supreme court attended the rites as honorary pallbearers, as did members of the federal, circuit, county and superior judiciary.

The active pallbearers included Dean Lloyd K. Garrison and Prof. Ray A. Brown, of the University of Wisconsin law school; Prof. William H. Kieckhefer, University economist; Dr. W. Stovall, director of the state laboratory of hygiene; Dr. W. J. Durkopp, and Robert Morse, Dane county circuit court reporter.

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
