BARTH BEING HELD HERE FOR ARMY AUTHORITIES

John J. Barth, 26, A. W. O. L.
South Dakota soldier held on a
check forgery count, was still in
custody at the local jail today as
police awaited the arrival of mili-
tary police, probably this after-
noon or tomorrow.

Dist. Atty. Daniel T. Hcsek
contacted Chicago military au-
thorities Thursday afternoon and
was informed that Barth would be
taken into custody by the Army.
A definite disposition of the sol-
dier's case will probably be made
when the Army men arrive.

Barth, who has admitted cash-
ing 22 checks in excess of \$1,000
drawn on purported military
funds in seven states, including
two cashed in Marshfield, is wear-
ing first sergeant's stripes but was
"busted" from that grade March
25, for an affair with a woman at
