Junior Baseball Circuit Approves 1945 Constitution

Adopted by-law and regulations for the 1945 season and the working out of an agreement for the use of Witter field in cooperation with the Wisconsin Rapids city baseball team highlighted a meeting of sponsors and commissioners of the Junior Baseball league at the Elks club Monday night.

Arrange With City Nine for Use of Diamond

The eight teams comprising the circuit—Abel's, Johnson & Hill, Preway, Consolidated, Bethke's, Tribune-WFRR, Kruger's and St. Lawrence club—will be required to post a franchise fee of \$50 or before May 15.

Other features of the new constitution are as follows: (1) Any player attaining his seventeenth birthday before January 1, 1946, will not be eligible to participate.

(2) All scheduled games will start at 6:30 week nights, with Sunday and holiday twin bills to start at 1:30.

(3) Each team will submit by May 15 a roster not to exceed 15 players.

(4) Players in the Junior league must live within a 10 mile radius of Wisconsin Rapids.

(5) Each team will be allowed up to and including four players who will not have attained their seventeenth birthdays before January 1, 1946.

(6) Players are the property of the team that they were last affiliated with in 1944.

(7) After the opening day of play, those new players that are discovered will be used by the league commissioners to help strengthen weaker teams.

Monty Smith and Bert Dietzler, co-managers of this year's Wisconsin Rapids city baseball team, attended the meeting and requested the use of Witter field on some Sundays during the diamond season.

Upon motion by Les Plenke and seconded by Frank Abel, the Junior League sponsors voted to give the city nine the field each Sunday in May, the first Sunday in June, the first Sunday in July and every Sunday in September.

The problem of uniforming teams was discussed and it was pointed out by Frank Abel and Ray Johnson that it would be impossible to buy complete uniforms because of wartime restrictions.

The complete Junior league schedule for 1945 will appear in The Tribune in the near future.
