Under the experiment a 19-member local governing board was given control—how much control is a matter of dispute—of the district's eight schools and 8,000 pupils.

Last spring the district sought to transfer out of Ocean Hill a number of teachers it accused of sabotaging the decentralization experiment. Officially the UFT has been for decentralization but not at a rapid piece.
