GOP Foreign Policy Against "World State

Chicago (A) Beating down an attempt by Gov. Sumner Sewall of Maine to "simplify" the language and eliminating some phrasing critieized by Wendell L. Willkie the Republican platform committee endorsed today a foreign policy plank again today, aft opposing a "world state" and proposing to maintain security by A meeting w peace forces."

Sewall told reporters that he had moved unsuccessfully in the meeting to eliminate the final phrase of an assertion that "we shall seek to achieve such (peace) aims through organized international cooperation and not by joining a world state."

Willkie, the 1940 presidential nominee, and a group of 15 Republican governors which included Sewall, had complained that this and the "peace forces" provision were am-biguous. Willkie charged that the plank might mean "no international organization at all."

Rejecting all these protests, the committee released immediately about one-third of a platform—expected to run nearly 3,500 words in length—which it planned to lay be-fore the convention at this afternoon's session (4 p. m. CWT).

Because the platform drafters appeared to have ignored largely the complaints of Willkie and the gov-ernors, there remained the imminent possibility of a floor fight on the foreign policy plank.
