## Police again sharing' wi

Members of the Wisconsin Rapids police department have joined with fire department members in publicly opposing a partial intergreation of duties of the two departments as proposed by a committee of the Common Gouncil.

In a joint statement appearing in a paid advertisement in to-day's Daily Tribune, the two departments charge that combining of police and fire duties in Wisconsin Rapids would "make it impossible for the police and fire departments to provide adequate fire and police protection and jeopardize life and property for the sake of so-called economy."

Members of the local firefighters union earlier had gone on record in opposition to the plan, but today's statement by the police contained in both the advertisement and a press release was the first public expression by the policemen on the matter.

In the press release, members of the Wisconsin Rapids Professional Policemen's Association said that the only motive behind the city plan is "a possible monetary saving."

"It does not seem prudent to meddle with the protection of life, limb and property for the sake of economy. A dollar value cannot be placed on human life," the release stated, adding:

"Police work is a demanding full-time job without the added burden of firefighting, Police protection would suffer significantly during times when officers are at a fire. At the same
