Present awards posthumously for Pfc. Gary Folz

Three medals awarded posthumously to Pfc. Gary Lee Folz, were presented in person to his parents, -Mr. and Mrs. Clifford Folz, 650 Adams St., on Monday by Major Harvey A. Wright of Madison.

The Bronze Star medal for heroism, Purple Heart and Good Conduct medal were awarded to the local soldier who was killed in Vietnam Dec. 11, while assigned to Co. D, Battalion, 3rd Infantry, 199th Infantry Brigade.

An accompanying citation states—that—Pfc. Folz on that date was participating in a platoon size ambush when his squad came under intense enemy fire from a concealed bunker complex.

"Without regard for his personal safety, Private Folz exposed himself to the hostile enemy fire, the citation relates, "and maneuvered toward the enemy in an effort to cover the withdrawal of three men, one seriously wounded, pinned down by the enemy.

"While covering their withdrāwal drawal Folz was mortally wounded," according to the record, and "his courageous and aggressive actions resulted, in the freeing of those pinned down by the automatic weapon

Prior to his death Pfc. Folz had been awarded the National Defense Service medal, Vietnam Service medal, Vietnam Campaign medal, sharpshooter badge with automatic rifle and rifle bars and the marksman badge with machine gun bar.

Audit critical of athletic

dept. at UW

MADISON (AP) - The state auditor's office has issued a report critical of the past administration of the University of Wisconsin athletic department.

The report was submitted by State Auditor Robert Ringwood under a law requiring the auditing of records of every state agency at least once every three vears.

The report claims responsibilities were not met in mainte-nance and repair of the department's physical plant.

It noted that the university's physical plant director de-scribed the athletic department, complex as "inadequate, and in some cases inoperative due to neglect."

The audit report also claimed the department had more staff positions and paid out more in administrative salaries than other Big Ten members.
