

FRED BRUDERLI KILLED

Mr. and Mrs. G. Bruderli received a notice from France last week to the effect that their son, Fred, who was a member of the Canadian forces in France, had been killed in action. They had previously received a message to the effect that he was missing but later advices stated that he had been killed between the 27th and 29th of September.

Fred Bruderli was well known in this city, where he was born and grew to manhood. He was 30 years of age at his last birthday, which occurred on the 29th of September. He was a shoemaker by trade and for many years was employed at the Johnson & Hill store where he was engaged in this work. About two years ago he left for North Dakota, where he worked in a large shoe store, and from there he went to Winnipeg, and soon after arriving there he enlisted in the Canadian army and was soon sent to France. His enlistment occurred on Jan. 10th, 1918, and the last his parents heard from him was in a letter dated on the 12th of September.

Fred was a single man and had a large acquaintance in this city among both young and old, and there are many friends here who were grieved to hear of his untimely death, but they are all glad to know that he died in a good cause.
