New York -(P)- International radio communication was snarled for the third consecutive day today

for the third consecutive day today by atmospheric conditions resulting from a sun spot "curtain."

Press Wireless Inc., MacKay radio, and RCA reported a "total blackout" on communications with Europe. But Press Wireless and MacKay said the sun spot caused only "very slight" interference on their north-south circuit to South America. America.

The sun spot treated residents of many parts of the country to a bril-liant display of northern lights last night. The aurora borealis was visible in New York, Philadelphia, Washington, Chicago, in New Jer-sey and over southern states as far south as Texas.

An airplane pilot flying over Rockford, Ill., 100 miles northwest of Chicago, radioed that he could read a newspaper by the aurora boreallis illumination.
