Case of Lloyd Francis Mosher versus Oliver Grant was joined this morning when the adjourned November term of county court was reconvened here by Judge Frank W. Calkins.

The dispute between a son and the son-in-law of the late John Mosher, town of Wood, centers about certain items, including a team of horses and a double harness, which Lloyd Mosher, the son, claims were his own property, and not part of the farm property which was left to Grant by the elder Mosher's will.

On June 1, 1943, the plaintiff contends, he went to the farm of Oliver Grant, for the purpose of obtaining his team and harness. At that time, Mosher asserts, Grant threatened him with a rifle, and ordered him off the property which had formerly belonged to his father.

As a witness for the plaintiff, the manager of a Marshfield store appeared to testify that Mosher had purchased the double harness in question at a price of \$69.95. Witnesses also testified in support of Mosher's that he purchased the team of horses in question at a price of \$160.

Case of the defense had not yet been presented when the court adjourned until 2 p. m. today.

## Marshfield Parents Lose 2nd Son in War

Marshfield, Wis.—Cpl. Robert Lange, 20, of the marine corps, son of Mr. and Mrs. William Lange of Marshfield, has been reported drowned in the Southwest Pacific area, according to a telegram received by his parents here this afternoon.

He is the second son of Mr. and Mrs. Lange to die in World War II, his older brother, Cpl. Cornelius Lange, having been killed in the New Guinea campaign in December, 1942.
