American Troops Conduct Determined Action at Guadalcanal

Washington - (P) - American forces on a general offensive in the Solomon Islands were reported by the Navy today to have won seven important positions from the enemy on Guadalcanal, to have killed 201 Jap soldiers and care tured 40, and to have virtually wiped out an enemy island base 190 miles to the northwest by sea and air attacks.

The places captured, a communique said, were six important elevations west of the American air field on Guadalcanal and the coastal village of Kokumbona where quantities of stores and equipment were seized.
