## MICHIGAN RESIDENTS RUN INTO DIVIDEND TROUBLE

Detroit — Michigan stockholders of the Tom Moore Distillery Co. face difficulties before they may gain possession of the 27 gallons of whisky per share they told newsmen "I have not talked company plans to distribute as a dividend on Dec. 21."

A temporary injunction restraining the company from distributing the liquor divide dissolved in Circuit Court Marshfield News Herald Monday.

Alfred W. Lindblom, Detroit counsel for the company, said the dividend would be in the form of negotiable certificates. A \$6 a gallon Federal tax would apply at the warehouse, but since any of the whisky may be distributed in Michigan approval must be obtained from the Michigan Liquor Control Commission.

from Councilmen before they were referred to the Finance Committee were suggestions for salary increases for a police officer and fireman.

The Commission, under date of Nov. 30, voted to pay Gun Sarowska, extra officer, \$150 per month beginning Jan. 1, and Andrew Gehl, who had now completed his probationary period, \$150 per month as a regular fireman. Sarowska is now paid at the rate of 50 per day and Gehl \$135 per nth.

Councilman J. J. Coates said that

proposed salaries were "entirely out of line" and that members of the department with years of service were not receiving that amount. Alderman A. J. Reeths also referred to the fact that a salary scale based on years of service is in effect.

Wisconsin Rapids — Two Wisconsin Rapids sailors, believed to have been aboard the escort aircraft carrier Liscome Bay which was reported sunk off the Gilbert Islands last Thursday, have been listed as missing in action, according to word received by relatives

The missing are Ensign Carl A. Mittelstaedt, 26, son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Mittelstaedt, and Gordon Firth, 17, gunner's mate, second class, son of Mr. and Mrs. Alfred Firth, route 1.

Ensign Mittelstaedt is married and his wife lives in La Crosse. In operation for 20 years, the well ended its usefulness when the well screen collapsed, causing it to fill up with gravel.

Numerous recommendations concerning the purchase of structural steel, reinforcement, form lumber, sand and gravel for the city garage construction project were approved by the aldermen.

Other Actions

The Council also:

- Approved the report of the City treasurer showing a balance on hand as of Dec. 1 amounting to \$129,500.89; the street commissioner's payroll expense for November amounting to \$2,620.51, including snow and ice removal expenses listed at \$644.86, and the report of the sewage treatment plant operator, which listed expenses totaling \$1,173.57.

Heard and approved the report by J. P. Murphy, city recreation director, which showed the reactivation program had accommodated 1,600 persons last month at an average cost of 12½ cents per participant. The attendance estimates did not include 66 members of the Knob Hole Club, a dancing club operated Friday and Saturday evenings by a group of young people who pay a small membership fee, elect their own officers and conduct their activity under


