The Silver Star has been awarded posthumously to the late T/5 Francis W. Primeau, Wisconsin Rapids, who was killed in action November 18, 1944 at Metz, France. The soldier's wife, Lillian, who resides on pute Route 1, received word of the citation from the war department.

The citation reads: "For gallantry in action against ren the enemy, on November 18, 1944. teles Primeau was a radio operator with the artillery observer team attached to the First division. His battalion was halted by German mortar, machine gun and sniper fire. To contact friendly artillery and reduce the German resistance. Primean crawled under the shelling to a foxhole from which he could observe the German mortar observation post. The foxhole held a good deal of water and to protect his radio Primeau crawled out to pick up material for a temperary helform

"German enlipers fixed on him but "go" mar improvise a radio-stani. "Primeau remained at his perilous station, directing further artillery support for the infantry battalion until 1400 that afternoon when, still performing his duly in a boldly superior manner, he was killed in action. Primean entered service July 20, 1942 and went overseas August 20, 1944.
