Mr. and Mrs. Reed had heard from their son recently by means of a letter which he had written from Italy on Oct. 10, and today they received a letter from his brother, Sgt. Orval Reed, enclos-ing a letter which Cpl. Reed had written on Oct. 12. Cpl. Reed, a graduate of the Marshfield High School, class of

Cpl. Reed, a graduate of the Marshfield High School, class of 1939, was inducted on July 1, 1942, and served at Camp Roberts, Calif., until the end of that year, when he was transferred to Fort George Meade, Md.

Reds Moving at Speed of 24 Miles Per Day; Enemy Sends Reserves

SOVIETS TAKE 70 TOWNS

London -(A)- The Red Army was rolling swiftly toward the Rumanian border today after taking the vital rail junction of Fastov, 35 miles southwest of captured Kiev, and thus snapping the principal rail link between German forces in the northern Ukraine and the Nazis still battling at

and the Nazis still battling at Krivol Rog.

A Reuters dispatch from Moscow said the Russians already had driven 10 miles on beyond Fastov and were engaged in heavy fighting with Nazi armored reserves rushed into the breach.

The mighty push, moving along at a speed of 24 miles a day, threatened to crumble Nazi resistance in the Dnieper bend and raised the possibility of trapping huge numbers of the beleaguered Germans.

Seizing trainloads of undamaged German equipment at Fastov, whose capture was halled in Moscow with 124-gun salvoes, Russian tank and i fantry units also were reported to 'ave swept up 70 towns and hanlets as they lunged toward Rumania, one of the Nazi satellites which Premier Joseph Stalin sald Saturday was "anxious to find a way" out of the war. In the Crimea, for to the south-east, the Russians said they kill-ed Local Germans in repulsing counterattacks on their bridge-heads war Kersh counterattacks on their bridge-heads near Kerch and generally improved their positions in that area. German broadcasts said the Russians were bringing up infan-try reinforcements on the Perekop Isthmus, northwestern gateway to the peninsula.

The 26th anniversary of the Soviet revolution also saw the Red Army driving to within 45 miles of the Latvian and old Polish borders on the north central front, where a Russian communique said the Nazis were losing "one position after another" west and southwest of Nevel.

Nazis Shift Positions

The Berlin radio, admitting that the Soviet smash southwest of Kiev had forced the Germans "to take up new lines," estimated that the Russians were using more than 250,000 troops in that area, while the Nazi-controlled Scandinavian telegraph bureau, declaring that German blood was flowing as never before, said the attacks beyond Kiev had made the Germans' positions "even more dangerous."
