Supreme Headquarters Allied Expeditionary Force (1)-American heavy bombers pounded half a dozen Nazi airbases in a great arc extending nearly half way around the Normandy battle zone today.

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Six airfields in seathern Normandy, the Paris area and near Boulogne were hit by around 1,000 Fortreases and Liberators as the Germans continued to hurry pilotless planes areas and rear special to a double-harrilled blow by Allied bombers arainst the French sector from which they are launched.
